## English Language Arts Middle School Curriculum

#### Week 1

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- Nonfiction
  - In any given text, a student will be encouraged to:
    - Find and analyze textual evidence to support an analysis of what the text explicitly says along with drawing inferences from the text
    - Summarize the events of a text in addition to how the central idea/theme of a text is conveyed through particular details
    - Analyze in detail how a key individual, event, or idea is introduced, illustrated, and elaborated in a text
    - Analyze how a particular sentence, paragraph, chapter, or section fits into the overall structure of a text and contributes to the development of the ideas
    - Determine the author's perspective and/or purpose in a text, and explain how it is conveyed in the text
    - Trace and evaluate the argument and specific claims in a text, distinguishing claims that the author supports with reasons and evidence from claims that are not supported

### Vocabulary

- Context Clues
  - Use context to infer, determine, or clarify the meaning of words and phrases
  - Use the relationship between particular words (e.g., cause/effect, part/whole, item/category) to better understand each of the words
  - Distinguish among the connotations of words with similar denotations
  - Prefixes and Suffixes: Familiarize oneself with common Greek or Latin affixes and roots as clues to the meaning of a word

- Consult reference material (print and digital) to find the pronunciation of a word or determine or clarify its precise meaning, part of speech, or origin
- Determine the meaning of words and phrases as they are used in a nonfiction text, including figurative, connotative, and technical meanings

#### Week 3

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- Writing
  - Argument/Claim Writing
    - Introduce a claim, using strategies such as textual analysis, comparison/contrast and cause/effect
    - Use an organizational structure/outline to group related ideas that support the argument
    - Determine a thesis, or sentence at the end of the introductory paragraph that presents and summarizes the claim
    - Support a claim with clear reasons and relevant evidence, using credible sources and demonstrating an understanding of the topic or text.
    - Establish and maintain a consistent style and tone appropriate to purpose and audience.
    - Use appropriate transitions that enhance the progression of the text and clarify the relationships among claim(s) and reasons.
    - Provide a concluding paragraph and strong final statement that follows the argument presented
  - Informative Writing
    - Gather research and information on a topic, organize ideas and concepts
    - Introduce the topic using strategies such as definition and classification
    - Determine a thesis, or sentence at the end of the introductory paragraph that presents and summarizes the claim
    - Develop the topic with relevant facts, definitions, concrete details, quotations, or other information and examples from various sources and texts
    - Include formatting (e.g., *headings*), graphics (e.g., *charts, tables*), and multimedia when useful to aiding comprehension
    - Provide a concluding paragraph and strong final statement that maintains and summarizes the information presented
  - Narrative Writing

- Engage and orient the reader by developing an exposition (e.g., *describe the setting, establish the situation, and introduce the narrator and/or characters*)
- Organize an event sequence (e.g., *conflict, climax, resolution*) that unfolds naturally and logically, using a variety of transition words, phrases, and clauses to convey sequence and signal shifts from one-time frame or setting to another
- Use narrative techniques, such as dialogue, pacing, and description, to develop experiences, events, and/or characters
- Use precise words and phrases, relevant descriptive details, and sensory language to convey experiences and events
- Provide an ending that follows from the narrated experiences or events
